#### **Statement of Intent**

With 16 years of clinical experience and the last 5 years spent coordinating the Children's Oral Health Initiative (COHI) for the Island Lake region, I have seen firsthand the impact of limited access to care on oral health outcomes, especially among children.

Through my work with the Four Arrows Regional Health Authority, I have dedicated myself to reducing dental decay and the need for surgical interventions in communities with high rates of dental disease. These experiences have shaped my understanding of the pressing need for advocacy, education, and sustainable programs tailored to the unique needs of Indigenous populations.

I want to join the CDHM Council to be a voice for underserved communities, especially Indigenous peoples, and to help shape policies that improve access to care.
